RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT TO ALLOW THE EXPANSION OF A WAREHOUSE & FREIGHT MOVEMENT USE IN A C-3, COMMUNITY COMMERCIAL DISTRICT, FOR THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1877 MADISON ROAD

WHEREAS, the application of Building Systems General Corp., on behalf of Woodman's Food Markets Inc. for a Conditional Use Permit to allow the expansion of a Warehouse & Freight Movement Use in a C-3, Community Commercial District, for the property located at 1877 Madison Road, having been considered by the City Council of the City of Beloit, Wisconsin at a public hearing held for that purpose and due notice of said hearing having been given by publication as appears by the Proof of Publication on file in the office of the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the City Council of the City of Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin does hereby grant a Conditional Use Permit to allow the expansion of a Warehouse & Freight Movement Use in a C-3, Community Commercial District, for the property located at 1877 Madison Road in the City of Beloit, for the following described premises:

Lot 1 of a Certified Survey Map as recorded in Volume 29, Pages 83-86 in the Certified Survey Maps of Rock County, located in the City of Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin. Said parcel contains 17.05 acres, more or less.

As a condition of granting the Conditional Use Permit, the City Council does hereby stipulate the following conditions and restrictions upon the Conditional Use, which are hereby deemed necessary for the public interest:

- 1. This Conditional Use Permit authorizes the demolition & replacement of the existing (attached) 71,678 square-foot warehouse with an expanded 91,546 square-foot warehouse that will connect the grocery store to the warehouse buildings along Madison Road.
- 2. The applicant, at their expense, shall relocate the existing sanitary sewer main under the east-west driveway to Burton Street prior to beginning construction of the warehouse addition. All work shall comply with City of Beloit standards.
- 3. The applicant shall install a Landscape Strip consisting of at least ten (10) landscape units per linear foot of right-of-way frontage between the Burton Street driveway and the northern limits of this addition. All landscaping shall be installed along the perimeter of the site on the outside of the chainlink fence. Trees and shrubs may be installed in the public right-of-way if there is no room on the subject property.
- 4. The property owner is responsible for storing trucks & trailers in appropriate locations. Short and long-term storage of trucks & trailers along the private Madison Road frontage road and adjacent public streets is expressly prohibited.
- 5. Prior to issuance of a Building Permit for this project, the applicant shall obtain an

- Architectural Review Certificate and a Certificate of Zoning Compliance.
- 6. Any major changes in the adopted conditions or use of the property shall be approved by the Plan Commission and City Council by amending this Conditional Use Permit. The Director of Planning & Building Services may approve minor changes administratively.

Overview/Background Information:

Building Systems General Corp., on behalf of Woodman's Food Markets Inc., has filed an application for a Conditional Use Permit to allow the expansion of a Warehouse & Freight Movement Use in a C-3, Community Commercial District, for the property located at 1877 Madison Road.

Key Issues (maximum of 5):

- This large parcel includes the Woodman's grocery store & parking lot, a warehouse attached to the store, a massive detached warehouse building along Madison Road, and a small gas station with quick lube & car wash services. Because the Woodman's warehouses at this site serve their grocery stores throughout the region, they are classified as an Industrial use (Warehouse & Freight Movement), which requires a Conditional Use Permit in the C-3 district.
- The applicant has proposed the demolition & replacement of the existing (attached) 71,678 square-foot warehouse with an expanded 91,546 square-foot warehouse that will connect the grocery store to the warehouse building. The proposed addition includes six loading docks and will eliminate the existing east-west driveway through this site. The existing sanitary sewer main under the driveway will be relocated to Burton Street at the applicant's expense.
- If this proposed addition is approved and constructed, the total floor area of the combined building will be 362,642 square feet or 8.33 acres, which amounts to 49% of the area of the entire parcel.
- Planning staff and the Plan Commission have recommended conditions of approval that address the utility relocation, landscaping along Burton Street, and the short- and long-term storage of trucks and trailers on site.
- The Plan Commission reviewed this item on December 19, 2012 and voted unanimously (7-0) to recommend approval of the Conditional Use Permit, subject to the six conditions recommended by Planning staff.

Request Overview/Background Information:

Building Systems General Corp., on behalf of Woodman's Food Markets Inc., has filed an application for a Conditional Use Permit to allow the expansion of a Warehouse & Freight Movement Use in a C-3, Community Commercial District, for the property located at 1877 Madison Road.

Kev Issues:

- This large parcel includes the Woodman's grocery store & parking lot, a warehouse attached to the store, a
 massive detached warehouse building along Madison Road, and a small gas station with quick lube & car wash
 services.
- Because the Woodman's warehouses at this site serve their grocery stores throughout the region, they are classified as an Industrial use (Warehouse & Freight Movement), which requires a Conditional Use Permit in the C-3 district.
- Woodman's constructed a 32,639 square-foot addition to the detached warehouse building in 2011. At the time of that addition, the floor area of the grocery store still exceeded the floor area of the detached warehouse building.
- The applicant has proposed the demolition & replacement of the existing (attached) 71,678 square-foot warehouse with an expanded 91,546 square-foot warehouse that will connect the grocery store to the warehouse buildings.
- The proposed addition includes six loading docks and will eliminate the existing east-west driveway through this site. The existing sanitary sewer main under the driveway will be relocated to Burton Street at the applicant's expense.
- If this proposed addition is approved and constructed, the total floor area of the combined building will be 362,642 square feet or 8.33 acres, which amounts to 49% of the area of the entire parcel.
- The attached Location and Zoning Map shows the various zoning districts and land uses surrounding the subject property. Uses adjacent to the proposed addition include a self-service storage facility, a church, a park, and single-family dwellings. There is a significant grade change between the subject property and the adjacent uses to the north. The subject property has a much lower elevation, as shown in the attached photographs.
- The applicant has already submitted detailed site & architectural plans for Planning staff review and approval.
- A preliminary Site Plan and other supporting documents are attached to this report.
- The City's Review Agents have reviewed this application and have not submitted any comments or concerns.
- The attached Public Notice was sent to fifteen nearby property owners. As of this writing, staff has not received any comments or concerns.

Findings of Fact

Based on Section 2-504 of the Zoning Ordinance, the Plan Commission shall make a recommendation based on the following considerations:

- a. Whether the establishment, maintenance, or operation of the conditional use will be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort, or general welfare;
 - Subject to certain conditions of approval, the proposed conditional use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort, or general welfare.
- b. Whether the conditional use will be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for purposes already permitted;
 - Due to the immediately adjacent commercial & institutional uses, the grade change of the site, the orientation of the loading docks, and the travel path to/from Madison Road, the proposed warehouse expansion will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of surrounding properties.
- c. Whether the conditional use will substantially diminish or impair property values within the neighborhood of the subject property;
 - On the contrary, the proposed improvement of this commercial property is likely to enhance

property values within the area.

- d. Whether the establishment of the conditional use will impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the surrounding property;
 - The establishment of the conditional use will not impede the development and improvement of surrounding property.
- e. Whether the exterior architectural design or site layout of the proposed conditional use is so dissimilar or otherwise incompatible with existing or proposed development in the immediate neighborhood that it will cause a depreciation in property values;
 - The proposed architectural design and site layout are compatible with the existing development with respect to design, materials, and function.
- f. Whether adequate utilities, access roads, drainage or other necessary facilities will be available to serve the proposed use at the time of its occupancy or use;
 - The applicant is responsible for relocating the existing sanitary sewer main that is in conflict with the proposed addition.
 - Adequate facilities and infrastructure are available to serve the conditional use.
- g. Whether adequate measures will be taken to minimize traffic congestion; and
 - The proposed addition is not expected to result in a significant increase in truck traffic.
 - Staff is recommending a condition of approval that prohibits the short or long-term storage of trucks & trailers along the private frontage road along Madison Road and adjacent public streets.
- h. Whether the conditional use will comply with all applicable regulations of the Zoning Ordinance.
 - The conditional use will comply with all other applicable regulations of the Zoning Ordinance.

Consistency with Comprehensive Plan and Strategic Plan:

The City's Comprehensive Plan recommends Community Commercial uses for the subject property, and the underlying C-3 zoning district classification is consistent with this recommendation. Consideration of this request supports City of Beloit Strategic Goal #4.

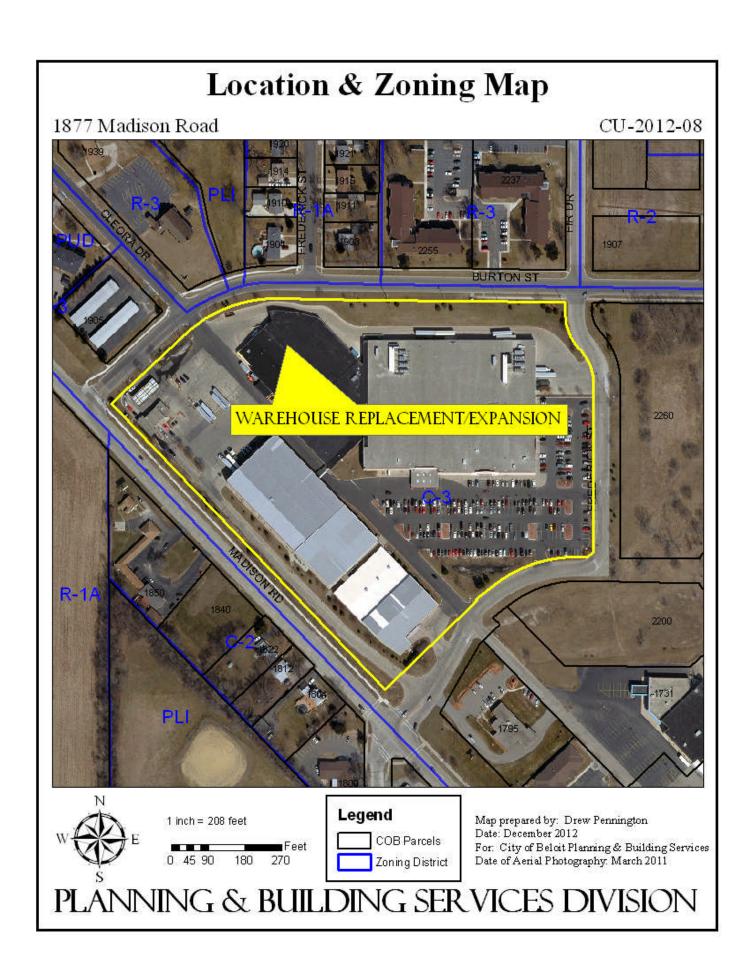
Staff Recommendation:

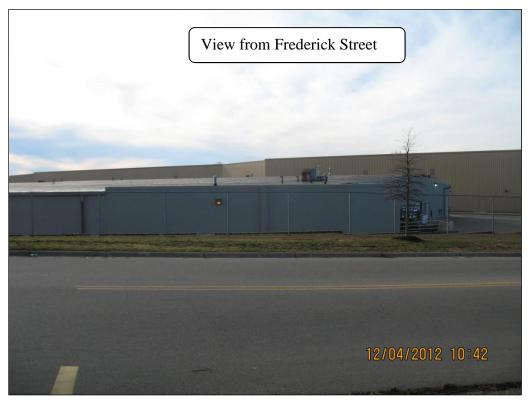

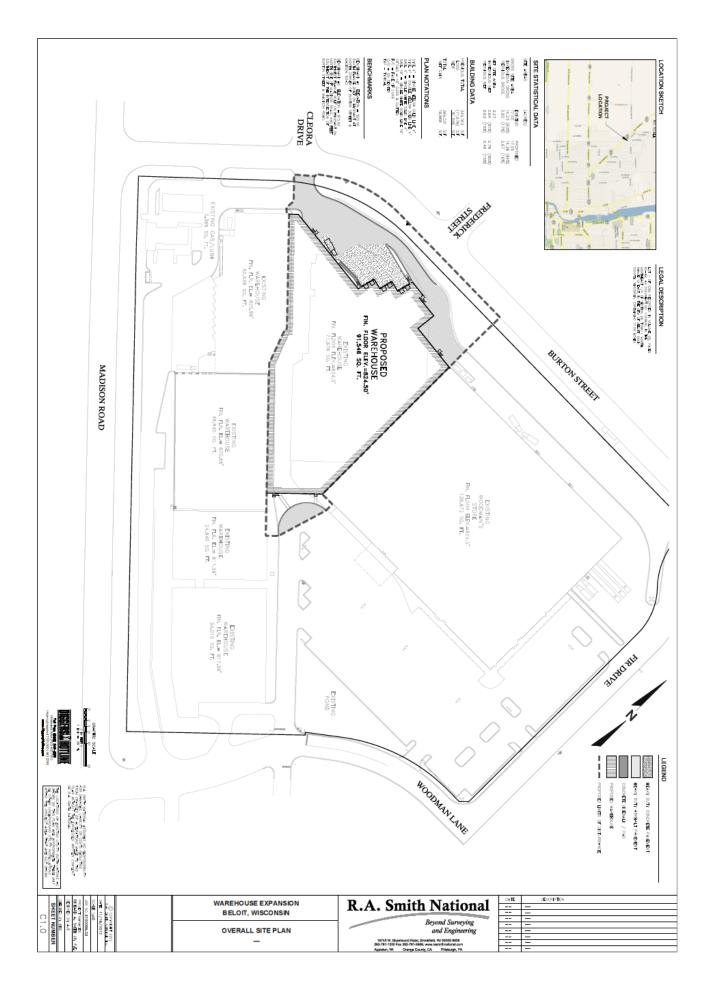

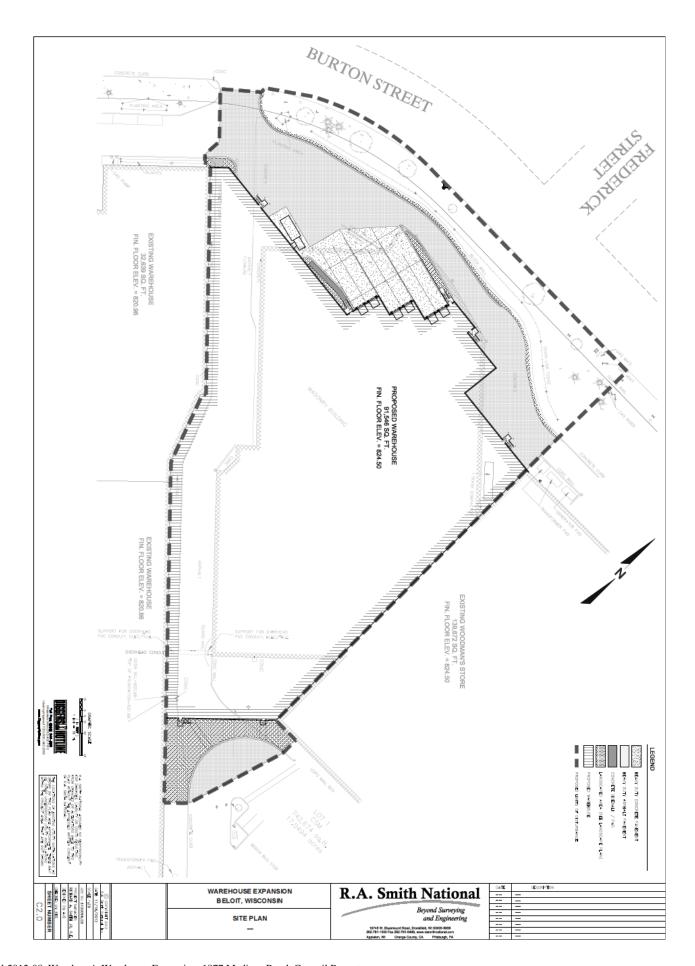

Building Systems General Corp., on behalf of Woodman's Food Markets Inc., has filed an application for a Conditional Use Permit to allow the expansion of a Warehouse & Freight Movement Use in a C-3, Community Commercial District, for the property located at:

1877 Madison Road.

The applicant has proposed the demolition & replacement of an existing 71,678 square-foot warehouse with an expanded 91,546 square-foot warehouse. The proposed warehouse includes six loading docks and will connect the existing Woodman's grocery store to the warehouse addition along Madison Road that was constructed in 2011. The existing east-west driveway that separates the store & accessory warehouse from the freestanding warehouse buildings along Madison Road will be eliminated. 9. COUNCILOR ACTIVITIES AND UPCOMING EVENTS

- Councilor De Forest welcomed the students in the audience and reminded them of the openings for youth representatives on City committees. She also said that she attended Grinnell Hall's holiday show celebrating John Kalkirtz's retirement.
- Councilor Van De Bogart congratulated everyone who participated in Holidazzle and reminded the public to drive carefully on snow and ice.
- Councilor Kincaid said that the City's new website was launched that day and that Holidazzle was a great success.
- Councilor Leavy echoed the praises for Holidazzle. He welcomed the students in the audience and reminded them that they can be part of the City.

10. CITY MANAGER'S PRESENTATION - none

11. REPORTS FROM BOARD AND CITY OFFICERS

- a. Assistant to the City Manager Beth Jacobsen presented a resolution approving the 2013 Stray Animal Contract between the City of Beloit and the Dane County Humane Society and authorizing the execution thereof. She indicated that this service was previously provided by the Rock County Humane Society, and that staff is recommending that stray animals be sheltered through a duel contract at both the Rock County and Dane County Humane Societies. Councilor Leavy made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor De Forest seconded. Councilor De Forest said that she appreciates the work done to come to this solution, and she requested that the Council be kept informed of any efforts to build a holding facility in Janesville. The motion carried 6-0. File 8578
- b. Ms. Jacobsen presented a resolution approving the **2013 Stray Animal Contract** between the City of Beloit and the Rock County Humane Society and authorizing the execution thereof. Councilor Leavy made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor Kincaid seconded. The motion carried 6-0. File 5956
- Economic Development Director Andrew Janke presented a resolution authorizing the City Manager to enter into an amended **Development Agreement** with Northstar Medical Radioisotopes, LLC. Mr. Janke introduced George Messina, President and CEO of Northstar. Mr. Messina said that the project has been delayed because they are in the process of redesigning the building based on upgraded technology. He said that they are currently sending applications to the FDA for approval while working to reduce the costs associated with the facility. Mr. Janke said that the scope and scale of the project has changed; therefore, the development agreement must be amended. Councilor Van De Bogart disclosed that his wife has done legal work related to intellectual property for Northstar, and City Attorney Tom Casper said that this does not constitute a conflict of interest for this project. Councilor Van De Bogart made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor De Forest seconded. Councilor De Forest asked Mr. Messina to address the 150 jobs promised in the original development agreement. Mr. Messina responded that even though technology has made their process more efficient, they will still need to staff the facility 24 hours per day. He said that he hopes there will be more than 150 jobs created by this project. Councilor Van De Bogart asked about the future of the facility if Northstar were to leave, and Mr. Messina stated that they will be using a very safe isotope and the facility will be clean after 90 days of nonuse. The motion carried 6-0. File 8505
- d. City Manager Larry Arft presented a resolution approving Sixth Amendment to **Development Agreement** between the City, et al and MLG and further approving Purchase Agreement, authorizing execution of the same and providing for Budget Amendment and Supplemental Appropriation. Mr. Arft explained that this resolution facilitates the purchase of 65 acres of land; buys the brokerage rights to the property; and appropriates the funds necessary. He indicated that this will be funded through Tax Increment District 10 without any borrowing. Councilor Leavy made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor Spreitzer seconded. Councilor Spreitzer asked about the single payment, and Mr. Arft said that the single payment allows the City to reduce the overall cost and eliminate interest payments. Councilor De Forest said that she will be voting in opposition to this resolution because she cannot approve a payment of this magnitude for land the City already owns. Councilor Van De Bogart inquired about the public/private development partnership that was created in the original agreement in 2000. Mr. Arft explained that the way business park land is marketed and sold has changed significantly since the original agreement. He said that now companies go directly to the City or the local economic development corporation for incentives, and that this deal will allow the City more flexibility in marketing the land. Councilor Spreitzer said that he does not like that the City has been put in this

- position by a previous development agreement but that this will assist in development of the area in the future. Councilor Haynes said that he is happy to remove MLG from the table when making land acquisition and development decisions. The motion carried 5-1 with Councilor De Forest voting in opposition. File 8306/7938/8514
- e. Finance and Administrative Services Director Paul York presented a resolution authorizing the **Transfer of Funds** from the General Fund Contingency Reserve Fund for 2012. He said that funds must be transferred into the Clerk's office budget and the Community Development budget. He said that there were two unbudgeted elections in 2012 in the Clerk's office, and that additional funds are needed in Code Enforcement due to a HUD finding in a recent audit. Councilor Spreitzer made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor Leavy seconded. The motion carried 6-0. File 8514
- f. Mr. York presented a resolution declaring **Doubtful Accounts**, authorizing amounts to be written off, and receiving and filing the 2012 Report of the Comptroller. Councilor Leavy made a motion to adopt the resolution, and Councilor De Forest seconded. Councilor De Forest asked if the Neighborhood Housing Revolving loan fund will be negatively impacted, and Mr. Arft said that there is program income coming into the fund each year and the amount written off through this resolution is a small percent of the total amount loaned. Mr. York said that the City's collection agency will still attempt to collect this debt. Councilor Van De Bogart asked if the Beloit Country Market had a personal loan guarantee, and Mr. Janke said that the City is going to trial on the loan and that the personal property taxes will be written off if the resolution is adopted. - g. Mr. York presented a resolution providing for the Sale of approximately \$7,565,000 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2013A. He introduced Jim Mann from Ehlers and Associates, who explained the three series of bond issues and the money to be saved by refunding them. Overview/Background Information:

This is an ongoing grant that is funded by the Office of Justice Assistance. It provides supplemental funding to communities for additional patrol officers based upon crime statistics over a three-year period. The city and department have received funding via this program since 1994. This 2013 grant is the first year of a three-year cycle of grant awards. Although the funding level has reduced drastically over time, it still partially funds two patrol positions. Our sworn officer numbers cannot decrease from their current levels or the continued funding may not be available for future years. Our sworn staff reductions this past year nearly caused us to be ineligible for this supplemental funding in 2013.

- OJA Federally Funded Grant Support Program for the City and the Department
- Without these funds, we would not be able to fund upwards of two sworn police positions
- Consistent with Agency Goals and Objectives in regards to addressing crime in neighborhoods

Partial Funding for Patrol Officer Positions.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 25.04(4)(d), 18.02(4)(b), 15.16(3) AND 15.17(1) AND TO CREATE SECTIONS 18.02(23) AND 15.15 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BELOIT PERTAINING TO ANIMAL CONTROL ENFORCEMENT AND DOG PARK REGULATIONS.

The City Council of the City of Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Section 25.04(4)(d) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby amended to include, in numerical order, the following additions to the list of city employees authorized to issue municipal citations for violation of city ordinances:

Chapter	Title	Enforcement Official
14.17	Dogs and Cats	Community Services Officer; Animal Control Officer
15.15	Livestock Prohibited	Community Service Officer; Animal Control Officer
15.16	Animals Not to Run at Large	Community Services Officer; Animal Control Officer
15.165	Defecation by Dogs or Cats on Public and Private Property Prohibited	Community Services Officer; Animal Control Officer
15.17	Dangerous Animals and Potentially Dangerous Animals	Community Services Officer; Animal Control Officer
18.02(4) and 18.02(23)	Park Regulations relating to Animals and Dog Parks	Community Services Officer; Animal Control Officer

Section 2. Section 18.02(4)(b) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(b) <u>Animals Not to Run at Large</u>. No person shall allow any animal to run at large in a City park in violation of §15.16 of this Municipal Code except as provided in (23) of this section."

<u>Section 3</u>. Section 15.16(3) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby amended to read as follows:

- "(3) IMPOUNDING AND RELATED FEES. Except as provided in §15.17(2), (7) and (11), any person who owns, harbors, or keeps an animal which has been impounded for running at large or for failure to display license or rabies tags, may reclaim the animal from the impoundment facility upon payment of the following:
 - (a) A Redemption Fee specified by the <u>impoundment</u> facilityRock County Humane Society or the Rock County Board.
 - (b) A Boarding Fee specified by the <u>impoundment</u> <u>facilityRock County Humane Society or the Rock County Board</u>.
 - (c) A Rabies Inoculation Fee (if required).
 - (d) A Dog License Fee (if required)."

<u>Section 4</u>. The term "officer" found in section 15.17(1) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Officer. Any <u>law enforcementpeace</u> officer, <u>or Rock County Humane Society community</u> services officer, or animal control officer."

<u>Section 5</u>. Section 18.02(23) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby created to read as follows:

"(23) DOG PARKS.

- (a) A dog park is an enclosed fence facility designated by the City for the purpose of allowing dogs, under the control of their owner or keeper, to exercise and socialize unleashed.
- (b) The Director shall have authority to control dog parks and to make reasonable rules for the operation of dog parks that are consistent with this ordinance. Such rules shall be approved by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission and shall be posted in a conspicuous place at the dog park. A person found to be in violation of such rules shall be subject to removal from the dog park.
- (c) Dog parks may be operated year-round on a daily basis from sunrise to sunset, unless closed for maintenance or severe weather.
- (d) Dogs are permitted to run unleashed in areas designated and posted by the city as a dog park under the following conditions:
 - 1. The owner or keeper of the dog must be present; and
 - 2. The dog must be under the voice control of the owner or keeper at all times;
 - 3. Current rabies vaccination tag and dog license as required by section 14.17 of this Municipal Code must be displayed on the dog's collar; and
 - 4. Feces must be properly removed and disposed of in compliance with section 15.165 of this Municipal Code; and
 - 5. The owner of the dog must have secured a permit for use of dog parks within the city. The permit fee shall be established by city council resolution.
- (e) Dogs that are engaged fighting with other dogs shall immediately be removed from the dog park.
- (f) Commercial use of a dog park is prohibited without written consent of the Director.
- (g) Any person convicted of violating any provision of this section shall be subject to a penalty as provided in §25.04 of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit."

Overview/Background Information:

Animal Control Program

Animal Control services will now be handled in-house by the Beloit Police Department. In order to accomplish the enforcement program, community service officers (CSOs) and animal control officers must be given the authority to issue citations for certain animal-related ordinances. The proposed ordinance authorizes CSOs and animal control officers to issue citations of those ordinances. CSOs and animal control officers will be certified as humane officers under state law and receive training in humane animal handling techniques, sanitation methods and animal diseases. The CSOs and animal control officers will also receive training in animal control laws and procedures found in the Wisconsin state statutes and city ordinances.

Dog Park

In order to enforce rules and regulations relating to the dog park, minor ordinance changes are needed. The first such change relates to exempting dogs from the ordinance that prohibits animals from running at large within city parks provided certain conditions are met, including the provision that the dog be within the fenced-in area designated and posted as a dog park. The proposed ordinance further authorizes the Director of Parks and Leisure Services to create reasonable rules and regulations relating to the use of the dog park and provides for a mechanism for enforcement.

Key Issues (maximum of 5):

- 1. The proposed ordinance will give CSOs and animal control officers the authority to enforce certain animal-related ordinances, including ordinances relating to animals running at large, dangerous animals, dog licensing and vaccination.
- The proposed ordinance provides law enforcement officers, CSOs and animal control officers the authority to issue citations for livestock kept within the city contrary to section 7.243 of the Code of General Ordinances for the City of Beloit.
- 3. The proposed ordinance makes minor amendments necessitated by the change in vendors for impoundment facilities.
- 4. The proposed ordinance exempts dogs from section 18.02(4) of the Code of General Ordinances for the City of Beloit which prohibits animals from running at large within city parks provided certain conditions are met.
- 5. The proposed ordinance allows the Director of Parks and Leisure Services to create reasonable rules and regulations relating to the use of the dog park and provides a mechanism for enforcement. Such rules and regulations must be approved by the Park, Recreation and Conservation Advisory Commission and posted in a conspicuous area of the dog park.

WHEREAS, there is no statutory requirement for a municipality to have a Disabled Parking Committee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Beloit, Rock County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

<u>Section 1.81</u> of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit is hereby repealed.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect upon passage and publication.

Overview/Background Information:

Section 1.81 of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Beloit established a Disabled Parking Enforcement Assistance Council. According to the attached November 12, 2012 letter to Council President Charles Haynes from Henry Clement, Chairman of the Appointment Review Committee, the City Council is being asked to repeal the ordinance creating the council and to disband the same. As outlined in that letter, it has been a significant time since the council has met with a quorum, there is no statutory requirement mandating such a council, and no adverse consequences are expected should the council be disbanded. The community service officers actively enforce the disabled parking ordinance as well as other parking regulations. In addition, one of the members of the City Disabled Parking Enforcement Assistance Council is also a member of a similar group established by the county board and may choose to remain active. Elimination of the council will not prevent the police department from taking violation reports from former council members or any citizen (council members never had authority to issue tickets directly).

It should also be noted that there have been repeated efforts to recruit new council members by both City staff and the Appointment Review Committee, which have not been successful.

Overview/Background Information:

In preparation of opening the Dog Park, the proposed Fee Schedule related to the use of this facility were absently omitted in the previous review of proposed Fees for the 2013 Fiscal Year. The Fees that are proposed have been previous reviewed and recommend by the Parks & Recreation Commission based upon similar fee structures at similar facilities, and a comparison of those fees has been evaluated in determining this recommendation.

Key Issues (maximum of 5):

- 1.) The Parks & Recreation Commission reviewed a comparison list of fees for 10 other regional Dog Parks in order before determining their recommendation for the new Dog Park Fees.
- 2.) In comparing user fees for Dog Parks, the average fees are as follow:
 - Resident Fees @ \$22.20/Dog
 - Non-Resident Fees @ \$30.83/ Dog
 - Additional Dog Fee @ \$9.07/ Dog
 - Daily Fee @ \$3.60 / Dog
- 3.) Only 1 out of 10 communities on the comparison list charged an additional cost to non-residents in regards to the daily fee.
- 4.) It is unknown how many Dog owners will purchase a Dog Tag for the Dog Park in the first year, however for the purpose of budgeting for this new facility, it is anticipated that if 50% of the dog owners who purchased Dog Licenses in 2012 also purchased a Dog Tag, it may generate approximately \$6,000 annually, and approximately 300 Dog Tags sold.
- 5.) The purpose of charging Fees for the Dog Park is to off-set general maintenance cost of operating this facility; including trash removal, mowing, and any necessary repairs to fencing and/or additional equipment needed to enhance the new facility.

XI. Benefits After the Death of the Participant

In the event of a Participant's death, the following shall apply:

A. Surviving Spouse and/or Surviving Dependents

The surviving spouse and/or surviving eligible dependents (as defined in Section XII.D.) of the deceased Participant are immediately eligible to maintain the account and utilize it to fund eligible medical benefits specified in Section X above.

Upon notification of a Participant's death, the Participant's account balance will be transferred into Dreyfus Cash Management fund* (or another fund selected by the Employer). The account balance may be reallocated by the surviving spouse or dependents.

If a Participant's account balance has not been fully utilized upon the death of the eligible spouse, the account balance may continue to be utilized to pay benefits of eligible dependents. Upon the death of all eligible dependents, the account will revert to the Plan to be applied as specified in Section VIII.

B. No Surviving Spouse or Surviving Dependents

If there are no living spouse or dependents at the time of death of the Participant, the account will revert to the Plan to be applied as specified in Section VIII.

XII. The Plan will operate according to the following provisions:

A. Employer Responsibilities

- 1. The Employer will submit all VantageCare Retirement Health Savings Plan contribution data via electronic submission.
- The Employer will submit all VantageCare Retirement Health Savings Plan Participant status updates or personal
 information updates via electronic submission. This includes but is not limited to termination notification and benefit
 eligibility notification.
- **B.** Participant account administration and asset-based fees will be paid through the redemption of Participant account shares, unless agreed upon otherwise in the Administrative Services Agreement.
- C. Assignment of benefits is not permitted. Benefits will be paid only to the Participant, his/her Survivors, the Employer, or an insurance provider (as allowed by the claims administrator). Payments to a third-party payee (e.g., medical service provider) are not permitted with the exception of reimbursement to the Employer or insurance provider (as allowed by the claims administrator).
- D. An eligible dependent is (a) the Participant's lawful spouse, (b) the Participant's child under the age of 27, as defined by IRC Section 152(f)(1) and Internal Revenue Service Notice 2010-38, or (c) any other individual who is a person described in IRC Section 152(a), as clarified by Internal Revenue Service Notice 2004-79.
- E. The Employer will be responsible for withholding, reporting and remitting any applicable taxes for payments which are deemed to be discriminatory under IRC Section 105(h), as outlined in the VantageCare Retirement Health Savings Plan Employer Manual.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING SALARY ADJUSTMENTS FOR NON-REPRESENTED CITY EMPLOYEES

WHEREAS, on August 20, 2012, the City of Beloit awarded a contract to McGrath Consulting Group, Inc. for the purpose of conducting a comprehensive position classification, compensation study and pay plan for all of the City's non-represented employees; and

WHEREAS, the study being prepared by McGrath, while in its final stages was not completed in time to implement the full salary adjustments by the start of 2013and is not expected to be fully implemented prior to March 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the approved Budget for 2013 set aside an allocation in the General Fund totaling \$160,000 with corresponding amounts in other funds equaling 2.75% of payroll for the purpose of implementing the position classification, compensation study and pay plan plus providing an across the board increase for all of the City's non-represented employees; and

WHEREAS, the budget adoption resolution while it authorized the appropriation, did not authorize any salary adjustments related to across the board increases or merit adjustments for non-represented employees pending completion of the pay plan; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the estimated cost to implement the pay plan will be \$50,000 for all funds leaving a sum adequate for a 2.25% cost of living adjustment for employees; and

WHEREAS following consultation with the consultant, Human Resources recommends that this across the board increase along with warranted merit adjustments be authorized using the current salary schedules in effect for all non-represented employees effective January 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, those changes in salary ranges will be incorporated into the new proposed pay plan prior to completion, with only the changes required to move employees that need adjustments to be made at the time of implementation, which is currently scheduled for March 1, 2013.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Manager is hereby authorized to implement a cost of living adjustment equal to 2.25% for all non-represented employees along with warranted merit increases, with implementation completed by adjusting the ranges for all current non-represented classifications by that amount effective January 1, 2013.

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER REOLVED that having recently completed the annual evaluation for the City Manager, the City Council further authorizes the same 2.25% across the board increase to be effective for the City Manager on January 1, 2013 as well.

Overview/Background Information:

On August 20, 2013 the City of Beloit awarded a contract to McGrath Consulting Group, Inc. for the purpose of conducting a comprehensive position classification, compensation study plan and pay plan for the City's non-represented employees. The study is in its final stages and is not expected to be fully implemented prior to March 1, 2013. However, it has been determined that the cost to implement the pay plan will be approximately \$50,000 leaving a sum adequate for a 2.25% cost of living adjustment and warranted merit increases for non-represented employees to be effective January 1, 2013.

Authorize 2.25% cost of living adjustment and warranted merit increases for non-represented employees to be effective January 1, 2013.
