ENGINEERING DIVISION

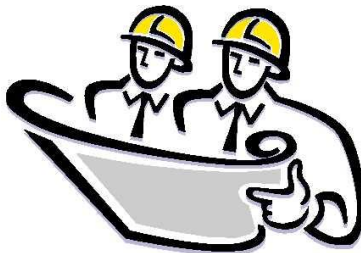

- Coordinates environmental services and makes recommendations on environmental issues

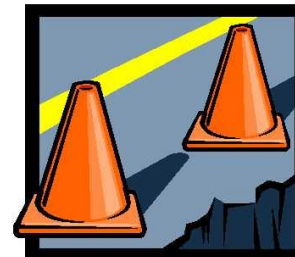

TRANSIT DIVISION

COME AND RIDE THE BUS

Regular route buses depart the Beloit Transfer Center, 225 Shirland Ave. at 6:00 A.M. and the last trip at 5:20 P.M. (depending on route).

On Saturdays the buses operate with the first trips leaving the Transfer Center either 9:00 A.M. or 9:40 A.M. (depending on route) and the last trip departs the Transfer Center at either 3:20 P.M. or 4:00 P.M.

The BJE - Beloit Janesville Express operates Monday to Friday only - no Saturday Service

Beloit Transit does not operate on the following holidays: New Years Day, Labor Day, Memorial Day, Thanksgiving Day, Independence Day, Christmas Day.

Riding a Beloit Transit System bus is EASY.

1. Locate your destination on a route map.
2. Check the schedule for bus times.
3. Have the correct change or your pass or token ready.
4. Board your bus.

WATER RESOURCES DIVISION

The City of Beloit's **drinking water system** is made up of: 2 aquifers, 9 active wells, 196 miles of mains, 2,551 valves and 15,507 meters. In 2011 the wells pumped 1.99 billion gallons averaging approximately 5.5 million gallons per day.

The **Water Pollution Control Facility**

is an advanced activated sludge facility that treats an average of 4.0 million gallons a day. The facility is required to meet several NPDES permit criteria. The treated wastewater, called final effluent, is ultimately returned to the Rock River to become part of the water cycle once again. Biosolids are recycled onto farmers fields as free fertilizer. The plant is controlled by certified operators. The City has 11 lift stations and 171 miles of sanitary sewer.



The City has a certified **laboratory** for both drinking water and wastewater.

The **Collection Crew, Maintenance and Engineering**

staff maintain well houses, lift stations, the treatment facility, storm sewers and sanitary sewers.

The **Environmental** staff protects the local environment and public health under rules mandated by the WI DNR and the U.S. EPA. This includes discharges to sewers, illegal discharges and releases of hazardous materials.

The **Stormwater** staff monitors water that is directly discharged to local waterways without being treated from the storm sewers throughout the City. All rain, melting snow and debris that goes into a storm sewer ends up in the nearby rivers and creeks. Of the City's 26 retention ponds, the City maintains 8 plus the 26 miles of underground stormwater mains.
