CRANSTON ROAD AND USH-51 PROJECT UPDATE

We've received the following update as of June 21, 2016:

- Storm sewer work should be complete by the middle of next week.
- Concrete crews will be on site working on curb, driveways, and sidewalk. This work will be north of Cranston at least for the next 3-4 working day.
- Once the storm sewer is complete south of Cranston, the contractor will be excavating the subgrade to the proper elevation and placing base aggregate. This work should start early next week.
- The stage 2 traffic pattern that is currently in use is expected to stay this way through approximately July 11th.
- When the concrete curb, sidewalk and driveways are poured, they will need some time to cure and get the strength needed for vehicles to cross. To allow for the concrete to harden, residents will be asked to park out on the gravel roadway at times. The contractor will coordinate the temporary closures by stopping at the affected property before they close the driveway. If nobody is home, they will leave a letter stating when the closure will take place.



FIREWORKS SAFETY INFORMATION

The City of Beloit Fire Department is looking for your help. Fireworks are synonymous with our celebration of Independence Day. Yet, the thrill of fireworks can also bring pain. Nation wide 230 people on average go the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries in the month around the July 4th holiday. <u>In Beloit it is illegal to use anything that</u> <u>goes up in the air or explodes.</u> Each year we experience fires, injuries, and over 400 neighborhood complaints regarding fireworks, and that's only on the few days leading up to and including the 4th of July. Consumer fireworks that are legal in the state used safely, in moderation, and in consideration of your neighbors will be an enjoyable experience for your family especially if you follow these safety tips.

- Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Avoid buying fireworks that are packaged in brown paper because this is often a sign that the fireworks were made for professional displays and that they could pose a danger to consumers.
- Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot enough to melt some metals.
- Wear protective eye wear, don't wear loose flammable clothing that could catch fire.
- Don't use homemade devices.
- Never place any part of your body directly over a fireworks device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.
- If you do get injures please seek appropriate medical care immediately.
- Report fires immediately.
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
- Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.
- Never carry fireworks in a pocket or shoot them off in metal or glass containers.
- After fireworks complete their burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding it to prevent a trash fire.
- Make sure fireworks are legal in your area before buying or using them.
- Remember pets are equally affected by fireworks. Consider their nerves and protect them from the noise.

VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVE JUNE 28th!

The Rock County Clerk's Office and 19 of the 29 municipal clerks that serve Rock County will be participating in the Voter Registration Drive on Tuesday, June 28th. Your municipal clerks know that the 2016 Elections are forecasted to have record high voter turnout and want to do everything possible to make the Elections run as smoothly as possible for everyone. That is why clerks across the state are hosting Voter Registration Drives on Tuesday June 28th. The greatest thing a new voter (or someone that needs to update their current registration) can do to help make Election Day a positive experience, is to register during the Open Registration Period, if able to do so.

What are the requirements to register or update a registration?

- **18 years old on or before the NEXT election.** The next state-wide election is August 9, 2016, so anyone who is now 17 and has a birthday on or before August 9, 2016, can register now if they meet the rest of the requirements.
- You must be a U.S. Citizen, not currently serving a felony conviction (either jail time or probation), nor been declared incompetent or ineligible to vote by a judge.
- You must have resided in your home for at least 28 days prior to Election Day in order to establish a new voting location.
- You must supply your WI Driver's License or WI State Id Number if ever issued.
- You must show Proof of Residency. The document must list your full name, your current address, and was issued recent enough to meet date requirements. The most common item used is a utility bill less than 90 days old. Paycheck, pay stub, bank statement (not a credit card), or your WI driver's license with your current address can be used.

Voters can check their voter registration at MyVote.wi.gov.

Regardless if your municipality is participating in a Voter Registration Drive on June 28, 2016 by extending their hours or adding staff, ALL voters can register or update a registration any time during their clerk's regular office hours, except for the day before an election. Please check with your municipal clerk to learn more about how and when you can register or update your registration.

Your Rock County Clerk's Office can also take voter registrations for any Rock County residents during the Open Registration Period.

For the Partisan Primary on August 9, 2016, the Open Registration Period ends on July 20, 2016. For the General Election on November 8, 2016, the Open Registration Period is August 10, 2016 through October 19, 2016.

Water Rebate Program

The City of Beloit Water Utility, an EPA WaterSense Partner, has established an incentive program to encourage residents to replace inefficient toilets and fixtures with new ones that are able to conserve water.

• A rebate of \$50 will be offered to individuals who can provide proof of replacing older, inefficient toilets with newer, efficient EPA Water Sense models.

• A rebate of \$25 will be offered to residential water customers who can provide proof of replacing old inefficient fixtures (i.e. shower heads and faucets) with efficient EPA Water Sense models.

Rebates are limited to an annual amount of \$100 per household. Rebates are available on first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted.

Customer Eligibility for the Rebate:

Look for

Single family homes, condo, or multi-family dwellings no larger than four units are eligible for the rebate. Other eligibility requirements are: must be a customer of the City of Beloit Water Utility, must be replacing a toilet older than 1994, the new toilet/fixture must be listed on EPA's WaterSense list, and must be the owner of the property.

An original, unaltered, dated sales receipt listing the make and model numbers and a picture showing proof of installation **MUST** accompany the rebate application. Owners who occupy the dwelling (live full-time at the dwelling) may either use a licensed plumber to install the toilet/fixture or do it themselves. Owners who do not occupy the dwelling (i.e. landlords) must use a licensed plumber to install the toilet/fixture. The old toilets or fixtures cannot be reused. The applicant agrees and understands that the City of Beloit Water Utility reserves the right to inspect the installation of the fixture before or after the rebate credit is issued to the applicant. The applicant understands that City of Beloit Water Utility may withhold the rebate until any or all of the above listed conditions are met.

Checking for Leaks

• Take a look at your water usage during a colder month, such as January or February. If a family of four exceeds 16 units per month, there may be a leak. One unit is equivalent to 100 cubic feet or 748 gallons of water.

• Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter changes at all, you probably have a leak.

• Identify toilet leaks by placing a few drops of food coloring in the toilet tank. If any color shows up in the bowl after 15 minutes, you have a leak. (Be sure to flush immediately after the experiment to avoid staining the bowl.)

• Examine faucet gaskets and pipe fittings for any water on the outside of the pipe to check for surface leaks.
