2017 CURBSIDE COLLECTION OF YARD WASTE

Yard waste will be collected from June 12 through 15 on your regular trash day. A yard waste sticker will be required on all bags, bundles and/or containers. Yard Waste Stickers can be purchased at Walgreens, ACE Hardware, Public Works Operations Facility, City Hall Treasury, Grinnell Hall, and Leisure Services Office.

- Stickers are sold 5 to a sheet for \$7.50.
- Use only paper yard waste bags, Back-to-Nature Biodegradable bags or clean trash containers 39 gallons or less (no plastic bags).
- Yard waste containers must weigh no more than 60 pounds.
- All brush and shrubbery must be bundled, tied or contained and tagged.
- Place yard waste curbside on your regular trash day during the collection dates.
- Place yard waste a few feet away from your regular trash.

EURASIAN WATERMILFOIL CLOGS RIVERSIDE PARK LAGOON

The Lagoon in Riverside Park is clogged with Eurasian Watermilfoil, a leafy water plant commonly found in shallow water basins, reservoirs, lakes and ponds in over 30 states, including over 400 lakes in Wisconsin. It is non-harmful and may serve as good spawning areas for many variety of fish. However, it may create a challenge when renting a paddle boat from the Lagoon Concessions. The City of Beloit is actively seeking a permit from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources in order to property treat the water to reduce and/or eliminate this invasive plant and restore the recreational activities in the Lagoon.

As temperatures increase this weekend, please take extra caution and be alert for pavement buckles on Wisconsin roadways! Pavement buckles are most common when the weather quickly goes from cool to very hot, causing pavement to expand. While it's difficult to predict if or where buckling may occur, please keep the following tips in mind:

- Slow down, buckle up and eliminate distractions to focus your full attention on the roadway. Along with pavement issues, other concerns this time of year can include deer or debris on the roadway.
- Watch for slowing traffic and be ready to move over for all roadside workers including highway crews as they
 repair damaged pavement.
- Before your trip, check the <u>511 Travel Information system</u> for the latest on any incidents or delays.
- If necessary, report serious pavement issues by calling 911. Be ready to provide specific location information.
