WEEKEND HEAT ADVISORY

The National Weather Service is forecasting high temperatures this Friday and Saturday with heat indices climbing to 105 degrees for the Rock County area. As a result, a Heat Advisory has been issued for Rock County from noon on Friday until 7 p.m. Saturday.

Cooling centers are available during the heat advisory. Citizens who do not have access to air conditioning in their homes are encouraged to seek out air conditioned facilities such as public buildings, malls, libraries or senior centers, or stay with family or neighbors who have air conditioning.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION PROJECT UPDATE - JUNE 28, 2018

Milwaukee Road Project Update:

- New speed limit in the construction zone of 25 mph.
- Travel lanes are limited to one lane for each direction; however, the corridor remains open with access to businesses.
- Work related to the new signals continues; multiple bases have been poured and electrical work continues.
- Most of the new sidewalks have been installed along with the retaining wall along Cranston Road. Pavement repairs for this phase are complete and grading work is on-going.
 - Work scheduled for the upcoming week includes:
 - Grading activities throughout the project
 - Continued work related to the sidewalks, curb and gutter installation associated with the signals and additional repairs to the concrete pavement
 - Short temporary outages at signalized intersection will occur as the contractor relays the power feed to the new bases. These outages are expected to last between 10-15 minutes, with stop signs utilized during the period when the signals are down.

The work on the Branigan Road Re-alignment project will begin after the 4th of July holiday and last approximately 30 days. The project will re-align the frontage road between Wal-Mart and Menards.

RESIDENTS REMINDED TO KEEP GRASS CLIPPINGS OUT OF STREETS

Bill Frisbee, Storm Water Engineer, reminds residents to keep grass clippings out of the street after mowing. Grass clippings can clog storm drains and put harmful nutrients in our waterways. Residents should direct clippings away from the streets while mowing and then blow back any clippings that land in the street. City ordinances prohibit the placement of any debris, such as grass clippings, in the street, gutter, sidewalk, or other public property.

2018 MONTHLY CURBSIDE COLLECTION OF YARD WASTE

In July, curbside collection of yard waste will take place from July 9 through 12 on your regular trash day.

- Yard waste consists of leaves, grass clippings, garden debris, brush and shrubbery (no larger than 4 feet long and/or 4 inches in diameter).
- All brush and shrubbery must be bundled, tied or contained with a \$1.50 yard waste sticker placed on it.
- Stickers are sold 5 to a sheet for \$7.50 and are available at Walgreens, ACE Hardware, Public Works Operations Facility, City Hall Treasury, and Grinnell Hall.

- Use only paper yard waste bags, Back-to-Nature Biodegradable bags or clean trash containers 39 gallons or less.
- Plastic bags cannot be used for yard waste.
- Yard waste containers must weigh no more than 60 pounds.
- Yard waste must be clean and litter free.
- Place yard waste at least 3 feet away from your regular trash.

Dangerous Heat and Humidity Friday into Saturday: Heat Advisory Issued

The National Weather Service is forecasting high temperatures this Friday and Saturday with heat indices climbing to 105 degrees for the Rock County area. As a result, a Heat Advisory has been issued for Rock County from noon on Friday until 7 pm Saturday.

With the dangers posed by summer heat, the Rock County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Health remind citizens to take extra precautions when the temperatures heat up.

Heat Exhaustion & Heat Stroke

General <u>heat exhaustion</u> symptoms include fainting, rash, fatigue and nausea. Skin can become clammy and moist, or hot and dry. <u>Heat stroke</u> can come on rapidly and may progress to life-threatening illness within minutes. If heat-related symptoms appear, action should be taken immediately to reduce body temperature. This includes taking a cool shower, bath or sponge bath. Wearing wet clothing also has a cooling effect.

Critical Precautions for Heat Safety

- <u>Never leave individuals or pets in parked vehicles.</u> Temperatures become lifethreatening within just minutes. 80 degrees outside can become 100 degrees within a vehicle in less than ten minutes, even with a window cracked open.
- Drink a lot of water avoid excessive amounts of caffeine and alcohol or heavy meals.
- <u>Limit physical activity</u> during extreme heat. Plan outings early in the morning or in the evening when temperatures are cooler.
- Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.
- Check on family, friends and elderly, those who are more vulnerable to heat.
- <u>Check on your pets more frequently in warmer weather and keep fresh, cold water</u> <u>available at all times</u>.
- <u>Keep living areas as cool as possible</u>. Cover windows to minimize sunlight into the area and utilize basement and ground level floors as they are generally cooler.
- <u>Utilize the Cooling Centers</u> if you do not have access to air condition during the day.

Pets and Livestock

- Make sure all pets and livestock have access to cool, clean water and shade.
- If you can, bring pets inside where there is air conditioning.
- Try to provide shade for all animals pastured outside.
- Limit exercising your pet to early morning or late evening hours when it is cooler.
- Warning signs of heatstroke in animals include heavy panting, glazed eyes, and excessive thirst. Seek veterinary assistance immediately.

Cooling Centers

Citizens who do not have access to air conditioning in their homes are encouraged to seek out air conditioned facilities such as public buildings, malls, libraries or senior centers, or stay with family or neighbors who have air conditioning. Several cooling centers are welcoming citizens to find relief if needed during their normal business hours.

Organizations and businesses that serve as Cooling Centers serve the community as airconditioned facilities where citizens can get out of the heat and "cool off". Citizens are responsible for their own belongings, water and nourishment. Cooling Centers are not over-night shelters. Citizens requiring overnight sheltering should contact local shelters for services.

City Encourages Safety During Independence Day Holiday

June 27, 2018 - In advance of the upcoming Independence Day holiday and related activities, the City of Beloit, the Beloit Police Department and the Beloit Fire Department encourage Beloiters to celebrate safely and responsibly.

We recommend that area residents attend the annual Pops on the Rock event, which begins at 7:30 p.m. with a free concert from the Beloit-Janesville Symphony Orchestra at Riverside Park and is followed by the fireworks show.

Outside of the fireworks show at Riverside Park, only sparklers, snakes, tanks, spinners, party poppers, snaps, smoke bombs, cone and cylindrical fountains are legal in Wisconsin. If it goes up, shoots a flaming ball or blows up, it is illegal. Bottle rockets, mortars, firecrackers, and roman candles are all illegal in Beloit.

If Beloit residents choose to use legal fireworks while celebrating Independence Day, we encourage the following safety precautions:

- Only adults should use fireworks. Children should only observe from a distance and not touch.
- Wear eye protection and do not wear loose clothing.
- Anchor sparklers in the ground, please do not hold them.
- Respect your neighbors and your surrounding environment. Please follow the city noise ordinance.
- Do not dispose of hot embers and devices in the trash. Please wait until the next day to clean up.
- Call for help or go to the ER immediately if injured.
- Dial 911 immediately if a fire occurs.

The City of Beloit wants everyone to enjoy a happy and healthy 4th of July celebration, however, we will actively enforce illegal fireworks violations for those that cannot regulate their conduct and endanger others in our community.

- A person who possesses or uses fireworks without a valid permit, or who sells fireworks to a person who does not have a valid permit, is subject to a forfeiture of up to \$1,000 per violation. Each firework illegally possessed, used or sold may be a separate violation.
- A parent or guardian who allows a minor to possess or use fireworks (not including those for which no permits are required) is subject to a forfeiture of up to \$1,000 per violation (and up to \$5,000 for non-parents or guardians).

The Beloit Police Department and the Beloit Fire Department encourage our community members to collaborate with us by talking to their friends, family, and neighbors about the dangers of illegal fireworks in populated neighborhoods and discouraging such conduct.
