CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Mark Preuschl at 6:33 p.m.

REVIEW OF MINUTES FROM THE JUNE 8TH AND JULY 8TH, 2015 MEETING

Chad Larson made a motion to approve the minutes seconded by Carol Mankiewicz. Motion passed unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS - ACTION REPORT ITEM

- A. Review and consideration of the proposed new Playground Equipment scheduled for purchase and installation in Vernon Park. Five separate vendors submitted a total of seven proposals which have been reviewed and evaluated by our Playground Committee in determining the two best proposals. The Public Playground Meeting was scheduled and held on Wednesday, July 22nd, 2015 in Vernon Park at 6:00 pm. A total of over 20 members of the public attended the presentation with a total of twelve voting and selecting the proposal submitted by MN/WI playgrounds. At the meeting their preference was for green and blue colors and the vote was split 6/6. The playground will be installed by no later than the end of October. Carl Lange made a motion to accept the proposal as presented by MN/WI Playgrounds for Vernon Park, and the alternate color scheme as presented in rendering #2 seconded by Chad Larson. Motion passed unanimously.
- B. Review and consideration of a proposal from the Rock County Historical Society to allow them to place small Geocaches within selected parks sites. The Rock County Historical Society introduces their newly proposed program, "Cache Quest". They want to get people out and about in Rock County. Geocaching is an outdoor recreational activity where a GPS receiver or mobile device and other techniques to hide and seek containers, call "geocaches" anywhere in the world. Geocaching is a treasure-hunting game that has become very popular and is enjoyed by all ages. A complete list of where the Geocaches would be located has been included. The participants within this program would still have to comply with all park rules and regulation. As long as we are aware of where all the Geocaches are and they aren't on any playgrounds, the request will be supported. Char Larson made a motion to support the request as submitted by the Rock County Historical Society as long as they comply with Park Rules & Regulations seconded by Carol Mankiewicz. Motion passed unanimously.
- C. Review and consideration of naming the newly acquired Girls Scout building in Big Hill Park. As of June 26, 2015, the City of Beloit purchased the former Girl Scout building in Big Hill Park. Currently we have two long-term tenants that will be sharing this space. The Welty Environmental Center is leasing approximately 2,000 SF on the main level and the Beloit Police Department is leasing approximately 250 SF in the lower level of the building. We have currently been referring to it as the Big Hill Center but it needs to be officially named in accordance to the Administrative Policy & Guidelines for Naming of Parks & Recreational Facilities. The building can always be renamed later but for now we want to label it. Mark Preuschl made a motion to refer to this facility as the Big Hill Center and acquire signage for appropriate identification seconded by Anthony Stewart. Motion passed unanimously.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS COMMENTS

- Anthony Stewart- Would like to know if we could put a drinking fountain in the dog park for the dogs and one for their owners because it is so hot in the summer. Also what would it take to put swing in Brown-Hatchett Park? Brian explained the playground replacement schedule that we have in place. The dog park is designed as a detention pond so we can't put a water fountain inside of that. The closest place would have to be where the pathway is to walk to the park itself. The cost to install would also be extremely expensive in order to run a water line.
- Carl Lange- Events that he is involved is consist of the Night Run this Friday at Leeson Park at 7pm. He will be trying out the High Schools timing software. On August 29th the Ride Across Wisconsin will be held.
- Carol Mankiewicz- Has started a big turtle project. At the golf course, Mark
 Young has been very helpful for logistics. Won't be marking the turtles at the
 course but the ones at Harpers Prairie will be. Likes to trap, mark, and measure
 the turtles. At Harpers Prairie there is a lot of wild parsnip. Brian stated that we
 won't be able to do anything about that until when a controlled burn can be
 executed.
- Mark Preuschl- The entrances where the gaps are in the fence line at Vernon Park are awful. There is also a pipe sticking up out of the ground. Can we dress it up a little bit? It's laid out like Summit Park. Why haven't we done anything about tennis courts that are still there? Brian explained that's why we have a master planning for parks as well as CIP plans.
- Chad Larson- Sonya Baden and Matt did a good job with the Kubb tournament that was held. It's a cross between hourse shoes and chess. They had about 20 teams this year. Beloit hockey will be selling stuff during the Dirty Dash. October 12, will be the first day of ice skating. Trying to get more kids out to skate. Learn to skate dates will be advertised soon with radio ads, TV, billboards and posters.

Chad Larson made a notion for adjournment; seconded by Anthony Stewart. Motion passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 8:06 p.m.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION NEW BUSINESS ACTION REPORT – ITEM A

MEETING DATE

September 9, 2015

TITLE:

Review and consideration of a Remembrance Garden in Horace White Park as proposed and presented by Beloit Family Services.

BACKGROUND

In October, 2014, John Pfleiderer, Executive Director of Family Services in Beloit, first addressed the Commission regarding their conceptual idea to develop a Remembrance Garden in Horace White Park. The purpose of the garden would be dedicated to those who have suffered from interpersonal violence and is intended to create a place for meditation. Currently, they are working with Angus Young Architecture in order to create an appropriate design which may include a pergola, benches, a deep-tone wind chime, a central rock sculpture, perennials, and would include a brick-style patio area. As Family Services is located directly across College from Horace White Park, they are interested in sponsoring this new feature within the park, and would like to review design and location for this proposed project with the Parks & Recreation Commission.

Furthermore, Family Services indicated that they would seek volunteers to adopt the new garden area in regards to maintenance and upkeep.

Since our initial meeting, we have had several discussions regarding this design, which include the impact within the park and the how it fits within the scheme and scope of the Master Plan for Horace White Park which was created in 2009.

Enclosed is a design plan from Angus Young regarding the construction of a Pergola as the central focus point of the garden, and a proposed garden designed as completed by the city's Horticultural Specialist, Sam Huffman. At the requested by Family Services, the plant material for the garden area has specifically been design with plants that generally attract butterflies as they are attempting to establish a theme for the garden.

BUDGET & FINANCIAL IMPACT

Family Services would be donating the garden and paying for the installation of all materials. Even though Family Services plan to use volunteers in regards to long-term care of the garden, the Parks & Leisure Service Division anticipates minimal impact to

our annual operation funds as related to long-term maintenance and care of the garden within the park.

PROJECT TIMELINE

- Determination of a generalized location within the park site at tonight's meeting.
- An appropriate design would need to be reviewed at a Landmarks Commission Meeting due to the historic significance of this park site.
- Upon approval of the Parks Commission and the Landmarks Commission, a presentation would be scheduled for review with City Council to accept the project.
- Currently, it may be possible to begin the construction of the Pergola yet this fall, and the development of the landscaping garden next spring of 2016.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based upon several planning meetings with John Pfleiderer, the staff has no objections to the proposed project, and highly recommends support of this project by Parks & Recreation Commission.







MEETING DATE

September 9, 2015

TITLE

Review and consideration of landscaping plan surrounding the Historic Plaque dedicated to Roy Chapman Andrews on Turtle Island in Riverside Park.

BACKGROUND

In October of 2013, the PARC approved the installation of a plaque on Turtle Island in Riverside Park which denotes the historic significance of a Beloit native, Roy Chapman Andrews (1884-1960).

Andrews, a graduate of Beloit College, was a renowned American explorer, adventurer, and naturalist who became the director of the American Museum of Natural History in 1934, and is credited with numerous archeological discoveries in the "Outer Mongolia" region of Asia as scripted in many of his biographical books. Andrews is buried in Beloit's Oakwood Cemetery.

In June, we met with the RCA Society and discussed their concepts regarding their request to add landscaping around the base of the Historic Plaque in Riverside Park and agreed to draft a design plan. Upon completion of the design plan, we once again met with the RCA Society to seek their approval for the landscaping plan.

BUDGET & FINANCIAL IMPACT

Based upon the preliminary design plan, it's estimated that this landscaping plan will not exceed \$5,000 and the RCA Society has agreed to fund the entire cost related to the landscaping project.

1) Routine park maintenance:

- Picking up litter and debris in all parks & along the business corridor of Milwaukee Road.
- Empty trash barrels in all parks weekly.

- Provided assistance in set-up of Bike Ride Across Wisconsin event held in Riverside Park.
- Trimming trees at Schellenger Park.

- Hired contractor to replace electrical panel support for the Lagoon fountains in Riverside Park.

- 1) Completed building new Landscape Planters on Milwaukee Road, and will be installing new planter material in late September.
- 2) Replaced the walking bridge between Hole #2 & Hole #3 at the Golf Course, and installed rip rap material next to the bridge and along the creek bed.
- 3) Watering hanging baskets and planters in Riverside Park, and on the Portland Avenue Bridge.

- 10) Met with John Pfleiderer, Executive Director of Family Services to review their proposal for a Remembrance Garden in Horace White Park, and currently preparing a landscape design plan that will enhance the proposed pergola.

Good clean fun? Not.

Nearly a dozen soles were forever lost to the dark depths of muddy pits at Big Hill Park on Saturday.

No tears were shed over the shoes, though. Runners had too much fun at the Dirty Dash to worry much about their footwear.

"That was the hardest part about the run, because you would get stuck in the mud," said Maggie Gianvecchio.

Gianvecchio, 17, of Beloit, joined in the inaugural Beloit Parks and Recreation event with friend Grace Roegner, 16.

"The walls that we had to climb over were the biggest challenge I think," Roegner said.

Saturday's weather was perfect for the Dirty Dash youth run/walk as the teen event kicked off at 9 a.m., featuring a 1-plus mile run with obstacles.

Participants in the inaugural Beloit Dirty
Dash had to run, climb over logs, maneuver
through tires and wade through mud pits at
Big Hill Park on Saturday. The event went
so well that organizers say it will be
making a return next year.

Soon following was a half-mile run with obstacles for children ages 10-13. The "bunny loop," was a short track with obstacles for kids age 5-9.

"The bunny loop and cotton trail were by far our larger groups," said Recreation Coordinator Sonya Baden.

Kembre Daniel, 13, traveled all the way from Chicago to run in the Dirty Dash with Max, Ben, Ellie and Nora Saladar — his cousins who live in Beloit.

"The run was so fun and also intense at the same time," Daniel said. "It really feels good to be outside and doing this."

Ethan Ramirez, 14, traveled to Beloit from Janesville to participate in the run while his mom volunteered to help out.

"I heard the word 'dirty' and I like running, so I was all about coming out here to try it," he said.

In all, around 340 participants came out to Saturday's event. Baden says the number of kids and community support was impressive.

"Originally we were hoping for 150 kids, but after all the support and encouragement from the community, the Dirty Dash is definitely something that we'll be doing again," she said.

Baden said any damage from building the course at Big Hill Park was minimal, and even the most frequent park user probably wouldn't notice anything awry.

"The main loop where there is a cross country trail was not torn up at all," Baden said. "We even moved around the existing trees in our parking area we made."

Beloit a big wheel for bikers

BELOIT — As almost 500 bicyclists rode into Beloit on Saturday, they were treated to nutritious lunch and entertainment ranging from the Beloit Memorial High School Pom Pon Squad and Even Start Dancers to gospel singers.

At around 11:30 a.m. the first bicyclists rode in over the Portland Avenue Bridge on their way to the Rotary River Center, the premier rest stop of a ride from Dubuque, Iowa to Kenosha. The 175-mile ride, consisting of avid bicyclists and members of the elite TREK Factory Racing Team, was held to raise funds for the Wisconsin Bike Federation, an advocacy group devoted to the interests of bicyclists and pedestrians. In its inaugural year, organizers are hoping to make it an annual event with thousands of riders. Beloit is hoped to be a permanent rest stop.


Local residents in the event included John
Pfleiderer, Phil Shields, Jon Nelson and Todd Peopping.

One of the first riders in on Saturday was Matthew Busche, the U.S. National Champion with the TREK Factory Racing Team. The team was stopping in Beloit before catching a bus to Chicago where they would be leaving for a bicycle tour of Alberta, Canada.

Busche said the hilly terrain wasn't easy, but the roads were nice and quiet.

Dave Cieslewicz, executive director of the Bicycle Federation of Wisconsin and former mayor of Madison, said it was an off day for the TREK Factory Racing Team, "who were kind enough to ride." He said Beloit was one of eight stops along the ride and had an impressive lineup of entertainment and volunteers at rest stops.

The rest of the riders were a bit behind schedule because of a south wind, according to organizer Rick Barder. However, it didn't dampen attendance as 477 riders plus the TREK team were signed up for the big day.



Passing through

Bicyclists rode into Beloit Saturday morning over the Portland Avenue Bridge on their way to the Rotary River Center. Almost 500 bicylists stopped through Beloit on a ride from Dubuque, Iowa to Kenosha to benefit the Wisconsin Bike Federation. "Beloit should be proud. The streets were well maintained and the directional people were helpful," said local rider Pfleiderer. "It was nice to see the cheerleaders and the band. I think it was a very positive statement for Beloit. There was nothing like it at the other rest stops."

Pfeiderer agreed with other riders, saying the ride from Dubuque was brutal. Although scenic, he had trouble seeing it because of the light rain.

Although he said he saw the "Van Gogh version" of the scenery, he said the ride was a great experience and he hopes it becomes an annual event.

"I see future opportunities for Beloit to be seen. It's a good opportunity for Beloit to make a statement for being a destination point."

It wasn't only the bicyclists enjoying the festivities on Saturday. Even Start dancers Cassandra Montes-Aguilar, 17, Anna Casique, 10, and Guadalupe Casique, 12, had arrived in colorful dresses to perform traditional Mexican dance for the riders. Cassandra, who said she'd been with the group since she was 3-years-old was looking forward to performing.

"I'm completely excited. I always wanted to see an event like this. I like riding my bike and would consider riding in it," Aguilar said.

Eric Eisenberg and Terri Burdick were volunteering along Portland Avenue Bridge, holding signs directing riders along the correct path. Eisenberg said he bikes several thousand miles a year and was eager to support the event and bicycling in Beloit.

"I've never had a bad day on a bike," Burdick said.
